Skatepark takes off

JUST over a year after opening, Sprotbrough's Anchorage Lane Skate and BMX Park is developing into a showpiece local centre for young people to develop their board and bike skills.

Thanks to an **£18,000** development grant from Barclays Spaces for Sports, local youngsters have been able to tap into free skate and BMX workshops and training sessions, professional displays, shows and competitions, including a trip to Liverpool's Rampwork Skate Park.

In June, coaching specialists Team Extreme came back to the park, where over 100 youngsters were eager to look, listen and learn from experts Neil Danns and Mike Mullen.

It was Extreme's second visit to the site, after a successful introductory event back in November 2005.

Coun Paul Dent, Chair of the parish council's Policy & General Purposes Committee, said: "We want the park to encourage young people to take up sport and improve their health as well as helping to strengthen community spirit. We want to see the site develop and to support this we have provided coaching kit and equipment to encourage residents to take part and get the most out of the new facilities."

The parish council commissioned the £100,000 park, boosted by grants of **£25,000** apiece from Barclays Spaces for Sports and waste recycling business WREN.

The skatepark is now home to the recently formed Sprotbrough Fracture Factory skate park user group, which meets regularly under the guidance of local man Steve Gratton, a former skateboarding and BMX champion.

● As Parish News went to press, the Anchorage Lane skate and BMX park was in the frame for a top regional award. It was one of six projects shortlisted for the Village Ventures Awards by the Yorkshire Rural Community Council. More news coming soon on our website.

THEN VANDALS STRIKE

VANDALS burning wooden pallets have caused serious damage to the surface of the skate park's bowl. The fire was started some time between the evening of Saturday 17 June and the early hours of Sunday 18 June. Parish councillors are appealing to local residents to protect the area by reporting any incidents of vandalism. Recently there have been cases reported of vehicles being driven around the adjacent playing field and alcohol is being drunk at the site at weekends. Damage has also been caused to the football pitches, St Edmund's Church and the Scout hut. Former Scout Goes Back To His Roots

FORMER scout Norman Dent went on a trip down memory lane when he presented the prizes at this year's Sprotbrough 6.5 kilometre run and family gala.

Parish councillor, Norman, 82 this year, told the assembled crowd that 70 years ago he too was a member of the 67th Doncaster Sprotbrough Scouts, who organise the popular annual event.

Norman handed out prizes to the winners of the various categories in the run, including one to the overall winner, Howard Darwin, who crossed the line in 24 mins 48 secs - just 19 seconds slower than last year's winner. Irene Boulton retained the crown as first female aged over 40 to cross the line, though her time of 34 mins 25 secs was 1 min 32 secs slower than last year.

But Paul Ashcroft held on to the first male over 60 crown, with his 29 mins 30 secs being some 28 seconds faster than his time last year.

Some 130 people took part in the run - which this year celebrated its 20th anniversary - helping to raise over £3,000 for the scout group from race entry fees and the associated gala.

WOODLAND HOMES TURNED DOWN

PLANS to build new homes in a leafy area of Sprotbrough have been turned down by Doncaster Council following a campaign by objectors.

Barratt Homes wanted to build 19 two and three-storey townhouses on woodlands off Park Drive, but the application was turned down by councillors at Doncaster Council's latest planning committee.

Sprotbrough and Cusworth Parish Council opposed the application, together with more than 200 local residents who wrote to the planning committee asking councillors not to approve it.

Barratt Homes now have six months to decide if they intend to appeal against the decision.

Parish Council Backs Sports Scheme

THE parish council has lent its support to a scheme providing sport and physical activities for local youngsters during the summer school holidays.

Councillors agreed to make the Goldsmith Centre and grounds available free of charge to Doncaster Council for nine days during July and August.

The borough council's Active Doncaster Service will use the dates to stage a range of supervised activities for up to 40 local youngsters, aged 8 to 13, each day.

The aim is to run the majority of the activities outside. If the weather is bad they will be staged in the Goldsmith Centre's main hall.

PARISH CRIMEWATCH

THIS is the aftermath of arguably the worst piece of vandalism ever carried out in Sprotbrough.

On 29 April, arsonists attacked the re-cycling bins to the rear of the Jackson/Sainsbury's car park causing £6,000 worth of damage, including clearance costs.

The blaze is thought to have been started by a group of six or seven mid to late teenage males who were seen near the bins shortly before smoke started billowing from them. Police are keen to hear from anyone who could help them identify the culprits.

The fire was so intense it destroyed containers housing tonnes of glass, cans, clothing and paper and scattered exploding aerosol cans several metres into the air.

Elsewhere, off-road motorcyclists who continue to use the Trans Pennine Trail illegally are being targeted by Sprotbrough Beat Manager PC Lynne Walker and colleagues, in what can be a risky business for the officers.

PC Walker said: "During the last Motorbike Operation spent most of the day on the Trans Pennine Trail around the Anchorage Lane and Sprotbrough Falls areas. We served two warning notices on offenders and two colleagues tried to stop two large off road motorbikes hurtling down the trail near Anchorage Lane area at 40 mph and were both very nearly run over in the process. Since then, where information has come directly to me, I have served further warning notices to offenders who have been seen riding off road bikes on the public highways.

"I have also been watching the access road off Newton Lane and the 'quarry' at the rear of Inglebrough Drive, following reports of nuisance motorbikes in those areas."

OTHER CRIME ISSUES:

- Police have been keeping an eye on Sprotbrough's St Edmunds Church following incidents, including thieves stealing slates from the roof.
- Over the past few weeks, there have been several 'sneak in' burglaries in Stonecross Drive, Melton Road and Sprotbrough Road, with thieves slipping in through unlocked front and side doors to steal valuables. A male was seen running away from one of them. Leaflet drops have been done in the nearby areas of all these burglaries to remind people to keep their doors and windows secure. An alert has also gone out to all the Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators in the Sprotbrough area via the Watch line system.

In another near miss, a woman walking with her nine year old son near the Boat Inn complained of three nuisance motorbikes scorching past them at 50mph, nearly colliding with them as they raced past.

But the Police are fighting back. At the end of May officers from Edlington and Mexborough who work for the West Safer Neighbourhood Team seized 14 motorbikes of various sizes and issued further warning notices in what is thought to be a record haul. The bikes were from all over the west of Doncaster - including Conisbrough, Edlington and Scawsby - plus a quad bike seized from a house at Denaby had been used on the Trans Pennine Trail in the Sprotbrough area.

- Police are carrying out evening patrols near the Wine Press and Sprotbrough Fish Bar premises on Sprotbrough Road, which is a popular area for youths to gather. Following a request from the Police, the youngsters now often congregate on Newton Lane or to one side of the shops, rather than standing directly in front of them which a lot of shoppers used to find intimidating.
- PC Walker has also been investigating reports of youths in cars gathering in the car park of KFC and Blockbuster and causing a noise nuisance. Allegations of drug taking have also been made, though since patrols were stepped up the problem seems to have reduced.

The building was made redundant two years ago when it was replaced by a new brick pavilion, funded by the parish council. Councillors initially tried selling the portable unit but to no avail, and for some time it looked like the parish council would have to pick up the tab for its safe disposal.

SPROTBROUGH'S Park View Surgery has strengthened links with its patients by forming a new participation group.

The Patient Participation Group brings together patients and practice staff who meet at regular intervals to look at ways of developing services, as well as other issues such as encouraging health education activities.

One of our first actions was to arrange for a touch screen information kiosk to be installed at the practice by DIAL Doncaster, and we plan to implement many more new ideas in the future.

Did You Know? *10 facts about Sprotbrough and Cusworth Parish Council*

1. It is a minor local authority, one of over 10,000 parish and town councils in the country.
2. The 17 parish councillors are called members and elected every four years.
3. The parish has six wards which are: Central, Cusworth, East, Park, Stadium and Stonecross.
4. The population of the parish is around 12,500, of which around 9,500 are electors - or parishioners - and eligible to vote.
5. The minimum age to become a parish councillor is 21.
6. Parish councillors are unpaid.
7. Parish councillors are required to sign a Code of Conduct, which includes a declaration of their business and financial interests; membership of other organisations; and personal conduct and ethics.
8. All the parish council staff are part time, comprising a clerk, deputy clerk, three caretakers and two cleaners.
9. The parish council office is based at the Goldsmith Centre and can be contacted by phone/fax: 01302 788093; or email: admin@sprotcuspc.wanadoo.co.uk
10. Facilities owned by the parish council include: senior and junior football pitches; the Goldsmith Community Centre; 50 per cent of Scawsby Community Centre; two sports pavilions, at Anchorage Lane and Newlands Park; four basketball courts; four children's play areas; a skate park.

There are four parish council committees - see back page for more details.

The work of members of the parish council includes setting objectives for improvements and new developments in the local area, together with the maintenance and upkeep of the existing facilities. Members try to reflect the needs of all sections of the community.

Members work closely with other partners, including Doncaster Council, South Yorkshire Police, community groups and parishioners.

The next parish council elections will be in May 2007.

● THE site now occupied by St Edmund's Church and Community Hall was once thought to house a hospital or place of hospitality dedicated to St Edmund and administered by a group of holy women – called Anchoresses - who devoted their lives to prayer, meditation and care of the needy. The hospital was dissolved at the time of the Reformation, after which the site became a farm. The stone barn, which forms the basis of the present church and community hall, was built in the 17th century. A brick-built extension was added more than 100 years ago. The farm flourished until the 1940s when the War Office requisitioned the building and land. The Diocese of Sheffield acquired the site in 1952 and the barn was converted into a church with ancillary rooms, including the community hall. The church was consecrated in 1954.
