New look Parish Council

THIS year's local elections brought changes to the composition of the parish council. Some 21 candidates stood for the 13 vacant seats, including the one in the newly introduced Danum Ward.

Nearly 6,900 votes were cast across the candidates by parishioners with four seats in Central and Stadium wards being uncontested.

Labour is now the majority party with 10 seats, followed by the Green Party with four and Conservatives with three.

Seven of the parish council's 17 councillors were newly elected in May.

Coun Pat Haith is the new chair of the parish council and Coun Judith Rodgers is vice chair. The members include three husband and wife couples - councillors Judith and Kevin Rodgers, Sandra and David Holland, and Sue and Phil Amson.

Meetings of the parish council take place on the third Thursday of the month at the Goldsmith Centre, Sprotbrough Road, Sprotbrough, starting at 7pm, with the exception of March and September when they meet at Scawsby Community Centre. No meeting is held in August.

Commissioner visits Sprotbrough

SOUTH Yorkshire Police and Crime Commissioner Dr Alan Billings attended a public meeting in the parish to discuss Putting Safety First - his 2015/16 Police and Crime Plan.

The plan has three strategic priorities - Protecting vulnerable people; Tackling crime and anti-social behaviour; and Enabling fair treatment - and can be viewed at www.southyorkshire-pcc.gov.uk.


Dr Billings said the title stems from the message that South Yorkshire people are giving him that they want to feel safe.

The Commissioner said South Yorkshire Police are facing tough financial issues, with 80 per cent of the Force's funding coming from central government and only 20 per cent from locally raised taxes. He said further cuts in government funding will have a major effect on policing, particularly as the Force is having to stand the cost of legal fees for the Hillsborough Inquiry at Warrington which, as Sprotbrough & Cusworth Parish News went to press, had already reached £16 million.

He said the Force is trying to offset the impact on front-line policing by sharing back-office services, like Human Resources and Finance, with neighbouring Humberside Police.

New 'toughbook' mobile computers are being issued to enable officers to complete their reports in situ rather than having to return to a police station. He said this should save round 150,000 hours a year of police time, being spent on travelling and administration.

With the Commissioner at the meeting at Sprotbrough's Goldsmith Community Centre was Inspector Richard Collingwood who heads the new Doncaster West Local Policing Team (LPT), which covers the Cusworth and Sprotbrough areas.

Insp Collinwood said there are between 15 and 17 police officers on duty in West LPT on every one of the five daily shifts. He said Sprotbrough and Cusworth are relatively crime and anti-social behaviour free compared to other parts of the West district.

The chart below shows that in the 12 months to the end of June 2015, more than one crime a day was reported in the parish, ranging from assaults to burglaries and cycle thefts.

WORK STARTS ON PARISH'S NEW OUTDOOR GYM

AS Sprotbrough & Cusworth Parish news went to press, work had started on the area's new outdoor gym, with completion set for August this year.

The gym which is being installed alongside the Anchorage Lane playing field car park, is spearheading what will be a three-pronged exercise project developed by the parish council.

Stage 2 of the project will see a three-quarters of a kilometre long exercise trail installed on the Anchorage lane playing field. Work is set to start as soon as the outdoor gym is completed.

This will be closely followed by stage 3 of the scheme, which involves linking the Anchorage Lane trail to a new one-kilometre long trail at Newlands Park.

A new quarter of a kilometre long path will join up the two trails, which will be way marked.

Work is expected to start on the Newland Park section in late August after the bird-nesting season is finished, as some of the sites copses will have to be thinned out to enable the new pathway to be constructed. The Newlands Park trail is

being specially designed to make it more accessible to walkers and to combat the effects of flooding during the winter months.

The project's designers are confident they have developed two distinctly different open spaces, with quiet relaxing walking opportunities at Newlands Park and social exercise sessions at Anchorage Lane.

Parish Chair Coun Pat Haith said: "There has never been a more important time to introduce ways for local people to keep fit or enjoy relaxing gentle exercise. Hopefully, parishioners will make good use of the facilities as part of a regular exercise programme".

The outdoor gym will comprise robust equipment designed to be weather resistant and feature a ski machine; pull-down shoulder press; chest press/ seated rower; cross trainer and bench press. A new cycle rack will also be installed for bikers.



Considering the new local plan

THE parish council has been asked for its thoughts on Doncaster's new local plan, which will be the new planning strategy for the borough.

It will guide development across the borough for the next 15-20 years and will replace the Local Development Framework Core Strategy.

Once adopted it will be used to make decisions on future development such as determining planning applications, provide certainty for infrastructure and public

service providers on their investment decisions and secure government funding.

The plan will be prepared in consultation with the public, businesses and organisations and parish councils.

A local plans officer from Doncaster Council is expected to attend a future parish council meeting to discuss the document in more detail.

MISSING STEPS

OBSERVANT readers may have noticed that a long-standing feature of Sprotbrough's local history has been destroyed.

A local resident drew the parish council's attention to the missing stone steps that used to allow public access along the public footpath which crosses from Thorpe Lane to the Ivanhoe cricket field.

Further enquiries by the parish council to Doncaster Council prompted a reply from one of the authority's Public Rights of Way team, who said the steps were damaged just before Christmas and were very dangerous to use.

They had to be closed until the landowner made them safe. But the landowner, rather than repair the steps, decided to remove them and this has made the footpath more accessible."

SOUTH Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive has announced new and improved ways of purchasing tickets and travel passes following the closure of the Information Centre at Doncaster Interchange.

PAYZONE

Use Payzone to purchase smart tickets from around South Yorkshire. Over 300 shops, many in local and rural areas, are now selling a range of 7 and 28 day Travel Master tickets. This means you can get unlimited bus, tram and train travel tickets without having to travel to an Interchange.

Once there, simply go to the counter and request the ticket you want to purchase through Payzone. There is a 50p

additional charge if a Smartcard needs to be purchased. If you already have one then this can be topped up free of charge.

Smart ticketing kiosks at Interchanges have been popular with passengers who enjoy a quick and easy way to purchase and top-up their Smartcards with a range of Travel Master tickets. Additional machines have now been installed meaning you can pay by cash as well as debit or credit card.

National Plant Monitoring Scheme - volunteers needed

THE New National Plant Monitoring Scheme (NPMS), which launched in Spring this year, will for the first time enable scientists to take an annual stock take of the UK's wild plants and their habitats.



But to do this they need the public's help. Organisers are looking for volunteers to carry out surveys of wildflowers and their habitats that will provide robust evidence of which

widespread plants are increasing or declining, as well as indicating the changing state of our most valued habitats such as grassland, fenland and even road verges.

Plants are nature's building blocks and this new monitoring scheme will sit alongside existing schemes for the UK's birds and butterflies to help us understand more about how the countryside is changing.

The search is now on to find 2000 volunteers to take part in the NPMS who will play a vital role in gathering information. Together the volunteers will monitor wild plants in 28 important habitats, ranging from hedgerows and meadows to salt marsh and scree slopes.

Hayley New, from Plantlife says: "The NPMS is hugely enjoyable and over 400 volunteers have helped us set up

the new scheme. It's easy to do and everyone will receive free training and guidance plus support from the partnership for volunteers who have queries, as well as web support and illustrated guidance notes - so volunteers will have the perfect survey tool kit to get them started!"



How does the NPMS work?

- Volunteers will be able to choose from three options depending on their level of expertise: recording from a short or extended list of target species in each habitat or recording all species they find in their plots.
- Volunteers will be given a 1 kilometre square with a grid showing up to 25 locations. Surveyors will be asked to visit three of those locations and carry out surveys in square plots and then identify two linear features such as hedgerows, rivers and road verges and survey these locations too.
- The squares have been randomly chosen, but with a focus on squares containing habitats of interest.

BEWARE OF BOGUS POLICE OFFICERS

THE Yorkshire and Humber Region has seen a significant increase in reports of vulnerable people being 'cold called' by bogus police officers over the telephone.

Victims are told their bank account has been compromised and they need to transfer money to another account or hand it directly to a 'Police Officer'. During the conversation the fraudsters will 'connect' the victim to their bank to confirm what they are saying but this conversation will be false.

The police are encouraging victims to hang up and wait five minutes to ensure the connection has been cleared and then contact their bank(s) or use a mobile phone to make the call.

The police will never 'cold call' and ask personal details about bank accounts.

If anyone is worried or has been contacted by these bogus police officers please contact South Yorkshire Police on 101 or, if it's happening at the time, 999.

All About Our Grant Awards Scheme

EACH year the parish council sets a small budget in order to provide grants to constituted community groups or registered charities. Any application is considered on the basis of whether the grant will either benefit the area or its inhabitants.

Applicants will need to provide information on the group's financial circumstances, the number of local residents who are members of their organisation, or the number of residents within the Parish that their organization has either assisted or expects to assist.

Grants for such purposes can only be made once in any financial year.
