A 21st century play area for Anchorage Lane

AN outdated local children's play area is set to undergo a major transformation after parish councillors gave the go-ahead to a £170,00 modernisation scheme.

Sprotbrough's Anchorage Lane park will be the second of the parish council's play areas to have new life breathed into it, following on from Sprotbrough's New Lane, which was completed a few years ago.

Sprotbrough & Cusworth Parish Council has secured an £85,000 Government loan to help fund the scheme. Additionally, Doncaster Council Bentley Ward members, councillors Charlie Hogarth, Jane Nightingale and Bill Mordue, have agreed a **£10,000** grant to support the project. The remainder of the project costs will be met from parish council funds.

Parish councillors have also given a commitment to provide modern children's play equipment for Sprotbrough's Goldsmith Centre site as funding becomes available.

Parish Chair Coun David Holland said: "We are delighted to be able to move forward with this really important and exciting scheme, which has been in the pipeline for a while. The current play area has served the community well for many years but the equipment is tired, expensive to repair and not in tune with what today's adventure seeking youngsters are looking for.

"We carried out a local consultation exercise, using on-line and face-to-face opportunities, to find out what kind of new play equipment people would like to see and their views have been reflected in the imaginative design. I'm sure it will please both parents and youngsters alike.

"There will be a mix of natural play, climbing units, space nets and seating, creating a 21st century play area, where children will be able to burn off some energy in a safe environment.

"The equipment we have chosen is designed for all children to use, including those with a disability and their carers.

"There was no grant funding available to offset the cost of the scheme and it would have taken us some time to raise the funds from existing sources so we decided to take out a Public Works Loan, which will be repaid over three years, to speed up the process and get these plans off the drawing board.

"It's hoped that work will commence in late summer/autumn this year, subject to appointing an appropriate contractor."



DONCASTER North MP Ed Miliband cut the ribbon to officially re-launch new-look Scawthorpe Community Library following the 57-year-old building's £150,000 facelift.

The money - which came from Doncaster Council's capital programme - funded a shopping list full of key improvements, including new:

- roof, ceiling and new lighting;
- disabled toilet;
- external mural across the front window;
- new windows throughout; and
- new kitchen and toilet for volunteers

Library Chair, Coun Kevin Rodgers, said: "The alterations have created a superb, very welcoming library that is a real asset to the community. We asked local people what they wanted from their library and their ideas helped develop the design.

AS Sprotbrough & Cusworth Parish Council News went to press, the Sprotbrough Neighbourhood Champions were busy reading through local people's responses to the first draft they have prepared of the Sprotbrough Neighbourhood Development Plan (SNDP). The Champions are a committed group of local volunteers who have got together to draft the Plan for Sprotbrough & Cusworth Parish Council.

The public consultation was the first step of a process that will ultimately see a local referendum take place to see if you and other residents are happy to see the final version of the SNDP used to influence planning applications in Sprotbrough.

The draft SNDP includes local planning policies to guide development in Sprotbrough until 2032 - the same time frame as the new emerging Local Plan for Doncaster. We'll keep you updated on progress in future editions of this newsletter and via the parish council's Facebook and Twitter pages.

Why does a 20mph speed limit matter?

YOU are seven times less likely to die if hit at 20mph rather than 30mph. Or 10 times less likely to die if you are over 60 years old.

There is a drop of 20 per cent in injuries when a 20mph limit is in place.

The 20mph speed limits around schools are not enough as slowing down for the last 100 metres doesn't encourage children to walk or cycle to school as 80 per cent of children are injured outside of the school 20mph limit. And 20mph does not always mean 'humps' have to be installed as other effective methods are available including, most importantly, community involvement. The decision to introduce 20mph limits is made by locally elected district councillors, not the Government.

... TO local resident Dave Glover and Warmsworth parish councillor Clarissa Jackson, who joined forces to tackle the on-going problem of HGV lorries taking a short cut over the bridges spanning the river and canal in the Don Gorge, which have a strict weight limit.



After stopping several trucks, Dave found that many had foreign drivers, who claimed not to understand what the signs said.

Dave and Clarissa worked with our parish council, Warmsworth PC and Doncaster MBC Councillor Cynthia Ransome to have outdated warning signs replaced with new ones at either side of the Don Gorge and beyond. The signs feature the latest internationally recognised symbols that continental drivers should now be able to understand.
